



ACT with Justice

Session Background

Purpose

The kingdom of God is a kingdom of peace, justice, and love. Young people will learn that being followers of Christ requires us to share the Good News with others and to work toward ending hunger, poverty, and everything that denies the dignity of the human person.

Objectives

Learners will

- ▶ know what the dignity of the human person means and what that dignity demands for every human being.
- ▶ explore ways that they can be a person of justice by examining their attitudes, relationships, and their interaction with the world.
- ▶ identify the values of the kingdom of God.

Catechist Formation

The Gospel that you hear during Mass on Sunday should challenge you. We all want to believe in a God who loves and comforts us, and we certainly have such a God. Feeling loved and restored is not, however, the whole purpose of Christian discipleship. If we do not also feel compelled to serve as Christ in the world, then we are missing the point. We are given new life through our faith in Jesus Christ and our good deeds. The faith comes to us through the Church community, our families, and others. It is expressed and proven in our actions. An important way we serve Christ is by serving others. If we fail to embrace that call to service, we cannot have a healthy relationship with our Triune God—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Catechist Prayer

Jesus, your Gospel message challenges me to be in relationship with people that our society often keeps at the margins. Help me love people more deeply and let that love inspire these young people to love more deeply as well. Amen.

Young Adolescents Learning Faith

- ▶ For young adolescents, this is a time of exploring the world, reflecting on new experiences so they can become participants in society. We have an opportunity to help them learn how to participate in the world in order to make a more just society.
- ▶ Young adolescents are beginning to ask the “big questions” in life. They need the context of faith, Jesus’ teaching on the kingdom of God, and the Church’s wisdom to help answer those questions. Be open to the difficult questions that are raised in this session, especially when the answers are complicated.

OUR Reason for Hope

Session Background

Purpose

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ gives us hope that this life is preparing us for something greater. We prepare not just by what we believe, but by how we live.

Objectives

Learners will

- ▶ explore the virtue of hope and how it relates to our outlook on death.
- ▶ understand what the Church teaches about heaven, hell, and purgatory.
- ▶ explore the meaning of Jesus' second coming and the last judgment.

Catechist Formation

We may prefer not to think of Jesus as a judge. It doesn't seem to fit the image that many of us have of him—mild, gentle, merciful. But it is important to remember that Jesus was passionate about justice, and when that passion was aroused, he was more than capable of expressing righteous anger.

In the parable of the last judgment in Matthew 25, Jesus equates how we treat others with how we treat him. This story teaches a profound truth about salvation, that our task as disciples is not only to be Christ for others, but also to see Christ in others. This is a truth that the Church has embraced for its entire 2,000-year history.

Young Adolescents Learning Faith

- ▶ Young adolescents are beginning to ask questions about life and death; some may have experienced the death of a loved one. Young people need an opportunity to reflect on these experiences in light of their own faith.
- ▶ Young adolescents are beginning to make moral decisions based on guides outside of themselves. Good guides typically include parents, family members, Church teaching, teachers, and wise friends. We have an opportunity to help them discover Christian values that will help them to make sound moral decisions.

Personal Sharing Preparation

THE COMMUNION of Saints

Session Background

Purpose

Three important avenues that lead to God include the communion of saints, sacramentals, and sacred art. Young people will explore the ways that these aspects of our Catholic belief and practice can help them grow in love and respond to God's grace.

Objectives

Learners will

- ▶ investigate the connection that we have to the Communion of Saints.
- ▶ discover a variety of sacramentals and learn how to use them to enrich their spiritual journey.
- ▶ look at religious art and icons as a way to honor those who are important in our faith.

Catechist Formation

Part of the richness of Catholic life is found in the way we worship. We pray with our entire selves, including our five senses. Our worship includes the taste of bread and wine, the smell of incense and candle wax, the lingering feel of holy water on the forehead, the sight of liturgical colors and stained glass, and the sounds of bells and choirs singing. But beyond these sensual experiences in our liturgical celebrations, there are also other dimensions of Catholic life and culture that engage our senses, like Knights of Columbus pancake breakfasts, living nativity scenes, and walking to Mass on a frosty morning.

All these remind us of the richness of our Catholic heritage. We are a people with a past, and we are connected to that past through historical, liturgical, and spiritual bonds that tell us who we are.

SAINTS

Examples for Living

Session Background

Purpose

The Catholic Church recognizes Church members who have lived lives of holiness and virtue by celebrating their lives and declaring them saints. Young people will learn what holiness means and take a look at Mary and why her “yes” to God gives her a special place of honor.

Objectives

Learners will

- ▶ understand the significance of Mary’s “yes” and her role in God’s plan.
- ▶ learn how the Church honors Mary as the greatest of all saints.
- ▶ examine our universal call to holiness.

Catechist Formation

Most of us need good role models. We need to be able to see that there are people in this world who face the same sort of challenges we face, and even greater ones, and who not only survive but excel. We need to listen to those who say, by the virtue of their choices, that we do not need to settle for mediocrity in life.

The saints are such examples. Far from being the untouchable, other-worldly figures we sometimes imagine them to be, the saints were actually not that different than us. They laughed, they cried, and they lived good lives, but also sinned. What makes them worth celebrating is that, despite their weaknesses, they ultimately were able to submit themselves to the will of God. Their example can give us the inspiration to do great things as well.

Young Adolescents Learning Faith

- ▶ One great gift that adolescents have is a wonderful sense of idealism—a sense that wrongs should be righted and things should be made fair. We have an opportunity to teach them the ideals and values to aspire to using the inspiration of the saints.
- ▶ Young adolescents are beginning the journey to discovering who they are. Heroes and roles models can help to shape their identity. We have a responsibility to be positive role models for them and to connect them to the heroes of our faith, the saints.

FROM AGE to Age

Session Background

Purpose

Knowing who we are involves knowing our history. Young people will take a look at the story of our faith in different time periods and examine the challenges and the joys of being a person of faith.

Objective

Learners will:

- ▶ investigate the history of the Church and the blessings and challenges.
- ▶ discover that in times of struggle the Church has always come back to her core values.
- ▶ understand that amidst the struggles of today, we are called to read the signs of the times and live out the mission of the Church.

Catechist Formation

When it comes to the history of the Catholic Church, every age has presented its own unique challenges. For the first generation of Christians, challenges came in the very clear form of persecution and martyrdom. Today, in our pluralistic society, American Catholics are challenged more often by material comfort than by persecution, but we are challenged nonetheless. Throughout our history, we have been threatened by forces from without and within. But through it all, the Church has not only survived but thrived.

Jesus promised that the Holy Spirit would always be with the Church. In every age, we have proven to be more than the sum of our parts, for while the Church is made up of individuals who are themselves imperfect, as the Body of Christ, we have accomplished greater things than any of those first Galilean fishermen would have ever imagined.

CALLED by God

Session Background

Purpose

Young people will learn that God calls each of us to serve him using the gifts that he gave us. Through prayer, we discern our vocation with the help of our family and our Church community.

Objective

Learners will:

- ▶ understand the importance of family and community in discovering their unique gifts.
- ▶ explore what it means to live out a vocation and understand discernment.
- ▶ learn about responding to God's call through the married life, becoming a priest, entering the consecrated life, or as a committed single person.

Catechesis deepens a person's understanding of the mystery of Christ and increases one's ability to integrate the faith into all aspects of life. In so doing, it helps individuals discern the vocation to which the Lord calls them.

Catechist Formation

Some of us have been conditioned to think of a vocation as something reserved only for the ordained or those in consecrated life. In a world that tantalizes us with material possessions and wealthy lifestyles, we often fail to stop to consider living our lives as Jesus did.

A vocation rooted in Baptism is every Christian's call to follow Jesus' invitation to use our personal gifts in whatever way God is calling us. In the Beatitudes, Jesus teaches that happiness is of the utmost importance to our loving Creator. In fact, the word *beatitude* means "happiness." Reaching our fullest potential generates happiness within.

Each of us is called to use our gifts and abilities for the glory of God rather than ourselves. Doing so is the root of happiness.



Reflect on the relationship between lifestyle and vocation. How are they similar? How does vocation go beyond lifestyle?



Catechist Prayer

Loving Father, I thank you for calling me to be a catechist. I ask that you empower me with all that I need to fulfill my vocation. May I surrender my inadequacies to the power of your Holy Spirit, and may I find joy in service. Amen.

Young Adolescents Learning Faith

- ▶ Young adolescents are beginning to discover who they are and what it is that they are good at. We have an opportunity to help them discover that their potential lies not only in what their gifts can accomplish for themselves, but also in the many ways to serve God by serving others.
- ▶ Young adolescence is a time of developing lifelong faith practices. Some of these will be developed by belonging to a faith community that values them and cares about them. Help young people find ways to use their gifts to participate in the life of the Church now.
